We are deeply saddened by the loss of our long-time member Barbara Huffer.

Since Barbara joined in 1999, she was active in the Educational Partnership Committee (EPC) projects of Power and Promise, Tech Trek, as well as WIT. Barbara was Torrance Branch Named Gift Honoree in 2006. Barbara was never noisy or self-important. She was determined, tenacious, serious, albeit always kind, always gracious.

Barbara led Power and Promise for twelve years, a lunchtime program for 6th grade girls, rushing to schools during her lunch hour. They discussed topics such as body image, women in the media, safety, and relationships. She also began a branch book donation program for the girls on related topics.

She was very committed to Tech Trek and served as EPC Co-Chair, School Buddy and Reader, and organized our camper speakers, as well as coordinated the venue at Toyota Auto Museum, for many October Tech Trek Celebrations. She was always there, always willing, always positive.

Barbara's volunteerism was evident with her early service in the Peace Corps. She was a teacher, and later worked for Toyota, from which she retired in 2010. Barbara enjoyed her family, including husband Hal, two daughters, and twin grandchildren. She was active in her church and ran their Heifer International program.

Hopefully she knew how much we appreciated and valued her. We remember her and honor her commitments, interests, and concerns. We will greatly miss Barbara.
