ACT IMMEDIATELY - LIFE MEMBERSHIP OPPORTUNITY

Avoid the price increase in AAUW National dues! Act now! Life memberships are \$980 if received by National by March 15. National dues are going from \$49 per year to \$59 per year. Life memberships (20 times annual National dues) are consequently going from \$980 to \$1180 at that time, and will be deductible. You will still need to pay CA state dues and Torrance branch dues annually. Click on https://www.aauw.org/resource/in-it-for-life/ National will send you a link to pay by credit card.

DUES INCREASE

Here's a heads up that it is almost time to renew your AAUW membership. Dues for National are increasing so a regular branch member (member of National, CA AAUW, and Torrance Branch) will pay a total of \$101. A renewal form will appear in your April, May and June Telegrams.

Underground Railroad, by Colson Whitehead

Cora is a slave on a cotton plantation in Georgia. Life is hellish for all the slaves but especially bad for Cora; an outcast even among her fellow Africans, she is coming into womanhood - where even greater pain awaits. When Caesar, a recent arrival from Virginia, tells her about the Underground Railroad, they decide to take a terrifying risk and escape. Matters do not go as planned and, though they manage to find a station and head north, they are being hunted.

In Whitehead's ingenious conception, the Underground Railroad is no mere metaphor - engineers and conductors operate a secret network of tracks and tunnels beneath the Southern soil. Cora and Caesar's first stop is South Carolina, in a city that initially seems like a haven - but the city's placid surface masks an insidious scheme designed for its black denizens. Even worse: Ridgeway, the relentless slave catcher, is close on their heels. Forced to flee again, Cora embarks on a harrowing flight, state by state, seeking true freedom.

As Whitehead brilliantly re-creates the unique terrors for black people in the pre-Civil War era, his narrative seamlessly weaves the saga of America from the brutal importation of Africans to the unfulfilled promises of the present day. The Underground Railroad is at once a kinetic adventure tale of one woman's ferocious will to escape the horrors of bondage and a shattering, powerful meditation on the history we all share.

The Manchurian Candidate

(1962)(Rated PG-13) Frank Sinatra considered his role in this film as his best, with co-stars Laurence Harvey and Angela Lansbury. Raymond Shaw (Laurence Harvey) is a Korean War hero with a lethal secret: He's been brainwashed by the communist Chinese. With one phone call, Shaw can be transformed into a deadly assassin -- unless fellow veteran Bennett Marco (Frank Sinatra) can stop them first. Some thrillers remain as suspenseful -- and timely -- as when they were first released, and this classic from director John Frankenheimer is one of the best. One of Ebert's Great Movies. (2004)(Rated R, violence and some language) In this very effective update from director Jonathan Demme of the 1962 political thriller, two U.S. soldiers are taken captive during the first Gulf War and brainwashed so they're programmed to rebel once they return home. Several years later, one of them lands on the vice presidential ticket, fulfilling the ambitions of his politically connected mother.
