Remembering Nancy Grace Roman

We were saddened by the passing of longtime AAUW member and renowned astronomer Nancy Grace Roman last month at age 93. Affectionately known as the "mother of the Hubble" for her role in developing the Hubble Space Telescope, Roman was the first chief of astronomy in the Office of Space Science at NASA and the first woman to hold an executive position there. (And she's one of four "Women of NASA" Legos!) She was a member of the AAUW Legacy Circle, a past president of the AAUW Washington (DC) Branch, and
