Torrance Branch and Start Smart Workshop

On August 2017, AAUW National and Mr. Michael Grimshaw, Executive Director of the Entrepreneurial Institute (EI), California State University, Dominguez Hills (CSUDH) signed a three year (October 2017- October 2020) licensing contract to promote Start Smart Salary Negotiation workshops on the campus. AAUW Torrance Branch funded the licensing fee and has been actively involved with the execution of workshops.

On October 26, 2017, Torrance Branch launched the Start Smart workshop in collaboration with EI. Branch members Michele Freck and Elle Oliver facilitated the first AAUW Torrance Branch Start Smart workshop with the students of Michael Grimshaw's business classes. The other attending AAUW members were Nancy Kenney and Elaine Bohrer with Indrani Chatterjee as an observer.

On October 11, 2018, Michele and Elle facilitated the second Start Smart workshop at the Entrepreneurial Institute, CSUDH. Using the program and materials provided by AAUW National, Michele introduced issues surrounding the gender pay gap and how to prepare for salary negotiations by knowing one's value, target salary and resistance point. Elle guided the students through strategies to control the salary discussion and she provided tips to effectively counter an offer and improve the salary package. The other attending branch members were Nancy Kenney, Karen Peters, Gloria Liu, Keri Gilbert and Kabita Kumar.

The Spring 2019 Start Smart workshop will be conducted on March 5 and March 7 at CSUDH.

AAUW Start Smart is specifically designed to teach university students how to negotiate salaries for a new job. In every two-hour workshop you will gain confidence in your negotiation style through facilitated discussion and role-play to learn

- How to identify and articulate your personal value
- How to develop an arsenal of persuasive responses and other strategies to use when negotiating
- How to conduct objective market research to benchmark a target salary and benefits
- About the gender pay gap, including its long-term consequences

Why is negotiation so important? AAUW's research on the gender pay gap shows that one year out of college, women are already paid significantly less than men. In 2009, women one year out of college who were working full time were paid, on average, just 82 percent of what their male peers were paid. And those lost potential earnings add up over a lifetime.

Women who negotiate upfront increase their potential to earn higher salaries and better benefit packages during their entire careers.

The book: TransAtlantic by Colum McCann

In 1919, British aviators Alcock and Brown made the first nonstop transatlantic flight, from Newfoundland to Ireland. McCann imagines a letter handed to Brown by a young photographer, written by her mother, Emily, a local reporter covering the flight, to be delivered upon their landing to a family in Cork. Years earlier, while on a speaking tour in Ireland with the mission to raise money for the abolitionist movement, Frederick Douglass forms a bond with young Isabel, the daughter of his host family in Cork. Lily, a young servant emboldened by Douglass' visit, sets out for America in the hope of a better life. About a century and a half later, former Senate majority leader George Mitchell is coaxed out of retirement to broker talks between the various factions with the intention of getting a peace agreement by Good Friday. At the tennis club, he meets a woman in her nineties who, years earlier, had lost her grandson to the Troubles. It is Lily and her offspring's stories set across different times and in many different places that ultimately tie every-thing together, as McCann creates complex, vivid characters (historical and otherwise) while expertly mixing fact and fancy to create this emotionally involving and eminently memorable novel.

A Big Day for Fair Pay

On January 30, the U.S. House of Representatives and Senate introduced the <u>Paycheck Fairness Act</u>(PFA) with support from every Democrat in Congress and bipartisan backing in the House. "The PFA is essential to eradicating practices that have perpetuated the pay gap for far too long," says AAUW CEO Kim Churches.

The team at AAUW was instrumental in prioritizing the bill by sending letters to Congress and engaging grassroots advocates, garnering 260 organizations in support. They also presented on the PFA to new members of Congress and spoke at the press conference introducing the bill.

The PFA would update the Equal Pay Act of 1963 and complement the Lilly Ledbetter Fair Pay Act of 2009, which ensures pay discrimination can be challenged regardless of when it began. We were thrilled to bring Ledbetter to Washington, D.C. where she met with more than a dozen members of Congress. The PFA is now designated as H.R. 7, signaling it is a top ten priority of the House.

STEM or STEAM?

In our recent meeting, the state board discussed changing the emphasis of STEM to STEAM in AAUW California. We still acknowledge that STEM is important for women to narrow the pay gap that exists between men and women. But how will the Arts and Humanities help women in their STEM careers?

I asked Director Ainsley Nies, a software engineer and tech team manager, to give us a quote about the value of the Arts. She said, "Educational and career outcomes are more successful when both sides of our brain interact. Learning science along with the Arts (music, design-thinking, theater, etc.) enable connections and the cross-pollination of ideas, creativity and innovation."

In our third quarter phone calls to branch leaders, the state board will be asking you what you think of changing STEM to STEAM. Perhaps you could discuss this idea with your branch boards and let us know when we call. We are always eager to hear from our branches.

Sue Cochran, Governance Committee Chair, governance@aauw-ca.org YOUR BYLAWS MAY NOT BE CORRECT!

One officer = ONE VOTE and CO-officers = TWO VOTES

Many branches are organizing themselves with new and creative methods, such as sharing leadership positions, to continue their responsibilities. This is great and gives them many opportunities. However, it has been brought to the attention of state and National governance that branches might have bylaws or policies that require two elected officers who share a position to also share a vote. This is not compliant with California law. Each officer is entitled to a single, independent vote, even if they are sharing a position. It does not matter whether a branch is incorporated or not with regard to this situation.

A good example is within AAUW California where we have co-presidents. Each of the co-presidents was elected as one of the 12 directors of the state board. Each of the 12 positions is entitled to a vote and therefore each of the co-presidents has a vote on the board of directors.

If your branch bylaws or policies state that co-officers share a vote, the branch needs to revise its bylaws to provide for one person/one vote for all board positions. This is easy to do. **The change can be made without a branch vote.** It is simply a matter of re-wording any section that refers to a shared vote to clearly state that each person in a co-position has a vote.
