From sexual harassment to disparities in STEM education, students are still experiencing discrimination in school. In addition, since the passage of Title IX, opponents have sought to weaken it; currently, the U.S. Department of Education is working to systematically dismantle Title IX protections.

Washington Update/Public Policy

[In June], we celebrated 47 years since the enactment of Title IX — June 23, 1972. While it may not be a milestone anniversary, this commemoration holds particular significance at a time when we have been facing administration rollbacks to this law's vital protections. In light of these attacks, our legislative work on sex discrimination in education is all the more important. There has been a lot of recent activity around this anniversary as advocates and Members of Congress seek ways to protect students.

AAUW is supporting several bills promoting women and girls' access to education; these include the Hold Accountable and Lend Transparency (HALT) on Campus Sexual Violence Act, the

Accountability of Leaders in Education to Report Title IX Investigations (ALERT) Act, the recently reintroduced Patsy T. Mink and Louise M. Slaughter Gender Equity in Education Act (GEEA), and the STEM Opportunities Act. Together, these bills form a forward-looking agenda aimed at providing more funding, accountability and resources for enforcing Title IX and other protections in education. We will continue to build on 47 years of progress, working until every student has equal access to education.
