Why is negotiation so important? AAUW’s research on the gender pay gap shows that, one year out of college, women are already paid significantly less than men — in 2009, women one year out of college who were working full time were paid, on average, just 82 percent of what their male peers were paid. And those lost potential earnings add up

over a lifetime. Women who negotiate increase their potential to earn higher salaries and better benefits packages. By negotiating fair and equitable salaries, you’ll be better able to pay off loans, buy the things you want and need, and even save (though it may seem like it’s far away) for retirement.

Women of AAUW Who Have Been Featured on Postage Stamps

Jane Addams (1940)

Jane Addams was the first woman to be awarded a Nobel Peace Prize, which she received for her work in social services and humanitarianism. She founded the Hull House in Chicago and served as the first president of the Women's International League for Peace and Freedom.

Eleanor Roosevelt (1963, 1984, 1998)

Roosevelt, who was awarded an AAUW honorary membership in 1929, was so accomplished we named an award after her. Notably, she implemented New Deal programs, worked with the United Nations, and was also a lifelong advocate for women's equality.

Frances Perkins (1980)

A longtime AAUW member, Frances Perkins served as secretary of labor under President Franklin D. Roosevelt and was an early champion of women's issues in the workforce, advocating for shorter hours and higher wages.

Rachel Carson (1981)

Biologist and author of Silent Spring, Rachel Carson was a 1956 AAUW Achievement Awardee. Her work sparked the modern environmental movement and paved the way for activists and scientists alike to pick up the torch.

AAUW offers membership to all graduates who hold an associates or higher degree from a regionally accredited college or university.
