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



Public Policy Message from State by Sue Miller, Co-Chair AAUW-CA Public Policy Committee

Get Ready for 2020!

2020 is nearly upon us, and it is going to be an eventful year... we will celebrate the 100th anniversary of women getting the right to vote, as well as the most important election in our lifetime where issues that matter the most to us are at risk. Primary elections are coming up March 3. Now is the time to begin planning at the branch level how to





AAUW CA is well positioned to undertake voter registration, especially with our college/university relationships. Millennial women are an important target group. Research shows that a lack of information on the candidates and a lack of policy debates on issues of importance is the main reason some millennial women don't participate in the election process, and may not even register to vote. Get involved by organizing a voter registration drive in your community





or on your local college campus. Don't forget: a successful voter registration drive must be a compliant one! Be sure to review the AAUW Guide to GOTV Dos and Don'ts on the national website.

Voter Education

AAUW aims to increase women's political influence and educate voters on issues that are important to women and girls. These targeted

efforts help increase the number of women voting. Consider sponsoring nonpartisan issue forums, perhaps collaborating with another organization such as the League of Women Voters. Perhaps you have a vacancy to be filled in the primary election, so consider a meet-the-candidate event or debate, and invite all candidates to give their positions on AAUW's key issues: Equal Pay for Equal Work/ Investing in Education/ Reducing Student Debt/ Strengthening Social Security/ Implementing Paid Leave. And certainly consider doing this before the November election.

What to look for from AAUW in 2020

A series of special programs to engage members and advance AAUW's priorities. In lieu of a national convention, the 2020 convening series will include webinars hosted by Kim Churches and featuring special guests throughout the year. We're also launching a campaign designed to gather information from members about their experiences, which will go into AAUW's archives; We're calling it "Your Story. Our Legacy."Additionally, we'll commemorate the 100th anniversary of the 19th Amendment and the 55th anniversary of the Voting Rights Act by launching a project called "Every Voice. Every Vote." It will focus

on ensuring that every voice is heard and every vote is counted. In keeping with its mission to advance equity, AAUW is committed to recognizing voting rights for women over the past century—including the fact that when the 19th Amendment was adopted, not all women earned the right to vote. It wasn't until 45 years later, when the Voting Rights Act of 1965 was passed, that women of color were granted the right to vote. Yet there are still challenges with voter access and voting suppression, which is why AAUW is focused on ensuring that every vote is recognized.

Centennial Celebration of the 19th Amendment

The 19th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution granted American women the right to vote, a right known as women's suffrage, and was ratified on August 18, 1920, ending almost a century of protest.

Isabella Beecher Hooker (Litchfield, CT) Feb. 22, 1822 - Jan. 25, 1907, married lawyer, 4 children, a founder of the New England Woman Suffrage Association 1869, defended Victoria Woodhull, sponsored 1871 suffrage convention in Washington DC, testified before Senate committee with Susan B. Anthony and at Congressional hearings, early supporter of federal amendment, socially prominent.
