Smart Start Updates

Although Michele Freck and I were scheduled to offer Start Smart workshops at California State University on March 17th and 19th, the campus was closed due to the Coronavirus on March 12.

However, I was able to provide three online Start Smart mini-workshops for Michael Grimshaw's students in his Small Business Management/Intro to Entrepreneurship and New Venture Entrepreneurship classes at the Entrepreneurial Institute at CSUDH on May 5. During the workshops we were able to help over 50 young people (29 of which were women) learn how to establish their value in the marketplace and negotiate to get the best salary and benefits packages possible. The Smart Start workshops are offered as part of AAUW's efforts to overcome the wage disparity gap for women.

Alice Matthews has offered to assist me with future workshops, and we are still hoping to hear from others who would like to participate/support our efforts. We will be looking to AAUW National to determine if CSUDH's license can be extended due to the Coronavirus shutdown.

Earlier this month, the Trump Administration issued a rule that will weaken Title IX, rolling back protections for student survivors of sexual harassment and assault.

"We urge the Administration to keep its focus on protecting our colleges and universities, minding the shaky economy and on keeping Americans healthy and safe," said AAUW Kim Churches in a press release.

Launching Gov Trek

If you've been looking for ideas on how to get more women engaged in politics, you will want to join us for a webinar on "**GovTrek: How to Rock the Next Generation**."
