

Membership Drive has started for 2022-2023! This year the process is a little different due to the upgrade to the online process. **Note: AAUW has asked members to hold off on renewing until the system issues** are resolved — no known ETA.



You will need to go to the www.AAUW.org, click on Log In. You will be asked to click "Forgot my Password" to reset your PW. You will receive an email with a link to reset your PW. Once that is done, you will be prompted to "edit your Personal Information" — you can now enter your cell phone number, as well as add your major from your degree.

Once you do this, you can click on Membership and renew using a credit card. This is still the preferred method to renew vs. sending in a check. Branches are listed by the number associated with each location: Torrance is #0146 (\$22). Then enter CA State dues, and National. You can select multiple branches if you want to add dual memberships. Just click all that apply — you will be asked which

branch is your primary branch and you can set it to Torrance.

- Works with your parent, guardian or caregiver to make sure you have all the support and encouragement you need on your pathway to STEM.


Carol Bauer Camperships



The Beekkeeper of Allepo by Christy Lefteri

Nuri is a beekeeper; his wife, Afra, an artist—living a simple life, in the beautiful Syrian city of Aleppo—until the unthinkable happens. When all they care for is destroyed by war, they are forced to escape. But what Afra has seen is so terrible she has gone blind, and so they must embark on a perilous journey toward an uncertain future. As they travel through a broken world, they must confront not only the pain of their own loss, but dangers that would overwhelm the bravest of souls. Moving, intimate, and beautifully written, this book that reminds us that the most peaceful and ordinary lives can be utterly upended in unimaginable ways.

Tini Zabutykh Predkiv (Shadows of Forgotten Ancestors); 1965, directed by Sergei Paradjanov

Shadows of Forgotten Ancestors is widely considered the best Ukrainian film ever made, and was acknowledged as such by the Oleksandr Dovzhenko National Center's top-100-Ukrainian-films poll of critics. On the surface, Paradjanov's film is a simple and timeless love story that evokes the themes in Romeo and Juliet, but it is distinguished by being set in the Carpathian Mountains along the Ukrainian-Romanian border. The film features the native culture and music of the Hutsuls, an isolated mountain tribe of shepherds (the production employed actual members of the community to perform as extras). Shadows sparked broader interest in the Carpathians as a space that affirmed Ukrainian cultural difference, from

Russians in particular. During the Kyiv premiere of the film in 1965, the Ukrainian literary critic Ivan Dziuba (who died two days before the invasion) took the stage to denounce Soviet policies of Russification. A massive riot in downtown Kyiv ensued.

Povodyr (The Guide); 2014, directed by Oles Sanin

Although many Ukrainian films made since the fall of the Soviet Union have explored the fate of Ukraine under Stalinism, none have done it quite so well as Sanin's The Guide. The film focuses on an American communist man and his son who go to the U.S.S.R. full of idealism in the 1930s and start a family with a local woman. The man and woman end up getting killed, but the son is saved by one of the blind musicians known as kobzari and becomes his guide. The kobzar is a key figure in Ukrainian folk culture, who is blind by definition and who plays a large lute-like instrument called a bandura. Many were killed in the 1930s because of their connection to pre-Soviet Ukrainian nationalism. The Guide is the first major film to explore this lost culture that once faced such heavy persecution. It is considered the best movie about Ukrainian culture that has been filmed in independent Ukraine so far.


Evening (Afternoon) Literature

We got our 16 spots! 8 at Whittier June 19-25, 4 at Santa Barbara Blackwell July 10-16 and 4 at Santa Barbara Hypatia July 17-23. No word on any camp cancellations. I have been getting notifications and updates from both camp directors.

Reading materials were distributed to our readers. The Applications and Questionnaires were edited to more create concise formats, i.e. fewer pages to print. All materials were emailed to readers, no hardcopies. Thanks to all our Readers and especially to Karen Hassen who read 2 additional schools besides the 2 she already had done.

Ranking and Camp Assignments

16 girls were selected. I submitted all the girls' names and status (Selected, Alternate, Not-Selected) to the online system, as well as the camp/dates. Getting the camp preferences in advance was a big help, and made it easier to assign each girl to a camp. The on-line submissions were due April 15.

Overall, the on-line system is better this year. The notifications sent to me were more helpful, and I did not need to refer to a large spreadsheet to copy/paste links to resend. Also a better format of the Application/Essay was provided, which made it easier to condense an Application to fewer pages for our reading.

Now the second part begins: Each selected family has 2 forms to fill out: a Parent Agreement and a Camper Agreement. So far, the camps are requiring vaccinations or a medical exemption. There is still a question about requiring boosters. Agreements are due May 1. As if this writing, 8 or our 16 girls are "Ready for Registration."

BRANCH COORDINATOR NEEDED:

In the past, we had another person doing the liaison with the selected campers and their families and the camps. This time everything is online. So the BC responsibilities are to follow up on any missing on-line forms, sending families any camp documents the camp directors want emailed, and reminding the families of their upcoming camp dates. Half of our girls will attend Whittier which is at the end of June. Is anybody willing to do this? Let me know—

Alice Matthews will be a Dorm Mom at Whittier and Santa Barbara Blackwell. THANK YOU ALICE!

Heads up—visitor days at SB will be on the Thursday of camp week. Members, donors are invited.

Orientation

At our April EPC meeting, we decided on having Zoom Orientations. With only 16 campers, we cannot justify the cost of renting a space or using a school facility. The plan would be to have two Zoom meetings, 1 for Whittier's 8 campers and 1 for Santa Barbara's 8 campers.

The format would have the girls introduce themselves, say something unique or something we should know about them. Meet other girls going to Whittier/SB. Girls from each school are not at the same camp, usually. Then we would show slides of videos of past residential camps. Show the water bottle they would be getting. Introduce/name sponsors, explain about thank you letters. Possibly have past campers speak. Then Q&A for parents. Total not more than an hour. Water bottles and thank you notecards with instructions would be delivered at camp or to their homes.

Thanks to Michele Freck whose persistence saved EPC \$279.60, when a large donor check was "sent" thru PayPal and the money was not credited to a camp, but erroneously went to SPF. We were going to be charged these fees, but Michele got it all cleared up and we paid nothing!

Also, fyi, the Alternates and Not-Selected girls were sent this notice: "We would like to let you know about other innovative hands-on science camps for girls entering 6th—9th grades. Check out the programs at Education Unlimited, the Sally Ride Science Camps for Girls, and iD Tech. Many local museums/aquariums also have summer programs."
