

UPDATE: Great News for New Members Joining AAUW!!

New joining members will receive a full 12 months of membership regardless of what month they join. If they join from the 1st though the 15th of a month, that will be their joining month. If they join from the 16th through the 31st of a month, then the next month will be their starting month.

Examples:

1. Join Date (1-15): – January 7, 2023 Membership – January 1, 2023 – December 31, 2023

2. Join Date (16-31): – January 22, 2023 Membership – February 1, 2023 – January 31, 2024

So be confident anyone you sign up will receive a full 12-month membership regardless of when they sign up!

AAUW California Celebrates Black Women in History for Black History Month

Many Black women have made significant contributions to history, thought, society, innovation, science, government, civil rights, women's rights and much more. For Black History Month, we celebrate the achievements of but a few:

Sojourner Truth, a former slave, became an outspoken advocate for abolition, temperance and civil and women's rights (1797-1883).

Rosa Parks and Claudette Colvin (age 15) helped Rights movement by refusing to give up their seats to white men on Alabama buses. Their actions resulted in the U.S. Supreme Court ruling segregation was unconstitutional.

Dorothy Jean Dandridge was an actress, singer and dancer. She was the first African American film star to be nominated for the Academy Award for Best Actress for her performance in *Carmen Jones* (1954).

Katherine Johnson, a brilliant mathematician, was one of three integrate West Virginia's graduate schools. Her greatest space exploration through her calculations synching Apollo's lunar-orbiting Command and Service Module. She also worked (1918-2020)

Madam C.J. Walker was considered the wealthiest African-American businesswoman in America and the first female self-made millionaire in the US. She developed and marketed a line of cosmetics and hair care products for Black women and hired 20,000 "ambassadors" to sell her products. She was a generous philanthropist and became politally active later in life.

Shirley Chisholm was the first Black woman elected to served as a representative from New York for 14 years, was to run for president in the 1972 race, and founded the Caucus in 1971 and the Congressional Women's Caucus in



Congress in 1968. She the first Black candidate Congressional Black 1977.



Mae Jemison became the first Black woman to fly to space on the space shuttle Endeavour. She was also the first Black woman admitted to the astronaut training program in 1987.

Toni Morrison released her novel *Beloved* in 1987, based on the true story of an African American Morrison became the first Black woman to win the Nobel



winner of the Pulitzer Prize, enslaved woman. In 1993 Prize in Literature.



Oprah Winfrey, born into poverty in rural Mississippi to a single teenage mother, molested as a child and pregnant at 14, became the most influential woman in the world by many accounts. An American talk show host, television producer, actress, author and philanthropist, she was the richest African-American of the 20th century and was once the world's only black billionaire.




The Menu (2022)

We Are Not Like Them by Christine Pride and Jo Piazza


Told from alternating perspectives, an evocative and riveting novel about the lifelong bond between two women, one Black and one white, whose friendship is indelibly altered by a tragic event—a powerful and poignant exploration of race in America today and its devastating impact on ordinary lives. Jen and Riley have been best friends since kindergarten. As adults, they remain as close as sisters, though their lives have taken different directions. Jen married young and after years of trying, is finally pregnant. Riley pursued her childhood dream of becoming a television journalist and is poised to become one of the first Black female anchors of the top news channel in their hometown of Philadelphia. However, the deep bond they share is severely tested when Jen's husband, a city police officer, is involved in the shooting of an unarmed Black teenager. Six months pregnant, Jen is in freefall as her future, her husband's freedom, and her friendship with

Riley are thrown into uncertainty. Covering this career-making story, Riley wrestles with the implications of this tragic incident for her Black community, her ambitions, and her relationship with her lifelong friend.

Born a Crime: Stories from a South African Childhood by Trevor Noah.

The memoir of one man's coming-of-age, set during the twilight of apartheid and the tumultuous days of freedom that followed. Trevor Noah's unlikely path from apartheid in South Africa to the desk of The Daily Show began with a criminal act: his birth. Trevor was born to a white Swiss father and a black Xhosa mother at a time when such a union was punishable by five years in prison. Living proof of his parents' indiscretion, Trevor was kept mostly indoors for the earliest years of his life, bound by the extreme and often absurd measures his mother took to hide him from a government that could, at any moment, steal him away. Finally liberated by the end of South Africa's tyrannical white rule, Trevor and his mother set forth on a grand adventure, living

openly and freely and embracing the opportunities won by a centuries-long struggle.
