Happy Women's History Month Torrance Branch!

Welcome to the second in a series of columns highlighting what AAUW has done and continues to do to promote its mission to advance gender equity for women and girls through research, education and advocacy. Since March is Women's History Month, it is the perfect time to highlight some of AAUW'S efforts, both historic and current.

Coincidentally, as I was working on this newsletter for Women's History Month, several of my interests collided: AAUW, women's history, and local theater. As a season subscriber to Torrance Theatre Company, I attended its most recent production, "The Half Life of Marie Curie." The play is a fictionalized story based on Curie's actual friendship with another female scientist. It not only spoke to the power of female friendship, but it made me remember that Curie actually received funding from AAUW, providing me with a great way to start this column.



Most of you might have known that Curie won the 1903 Nobel Prize in physics and the 1911 Nobel Prize in chemistry, becoming the first person ever to receive two Nobel Prizes. But, did you know that in 1920, the Association of Collegiate Alumnae (the predecessor to AAUW) helped raise money to purchase a gram of radium for Marie Curie? Curie's daughter later returned a portion of unused money to AAUW, which used the money to create the endowment that funds the Marie Curie Fellowship.

As I remembered this piece of our history, it made me search for even more. I have been a member of AAUW for nearly 35 years and I am still fascinated to learn more about some of the women who have not only been members, but who have been recipients of the AAUW American Fellowship. Here are just a few of these pioneering women:



Astronaut Judith Resnick, 1975-1976 AAUW American Fellow, was the second woman in space and a crewmember of the ill-fated Challenger space shuttle. She used her AAUW fellowship to complete her dissertation in electrical engineering. Not only was she an astronaut and an electrical engineer, but also a software engineer, biomedical engineer and a pilot.

Barbara Smith, 1978-1979 AAUW American establishing the field of Black Women's studies in founder of both the Combahee River Collective Table: Women of Color Press, one of the first scholarship for, about and by women of color.

Claudine Gay, 2003-2005 AAUW American Fellow was the first woman and first African American named dean of the Faculty of Arts and Science at Harvard University. In December 2022, Harvard announced that she will be its 30th President and will take office July 1, 2023, becoming the second woman and first African American to serve in that capacity.

As we are about to celebrate our 55th anniversary, we will highlight more of our own women in history and share more in the months ahead and at our Installation Brunch on Saturday, June 10. Here's to female trailblazers!

In this astonishing novel, Shanthi Sekaran gives voice to the devotion and anguish of motherhood through two women bound together by their love for one boy. Soli, a young undocumented Mexican woman in Berkeley, CA, finds that motherhood offers her an identity in a world where she's otherwise invisible. When she is placed in immigrant detention, her son comes under the care of Kavya, an Indian American wife overwhelmed by her own impossible desire to have a child. As Soli fights for her son, Kavya builds her love on a fault line, her heart wrapped around someone else's child. Exploring the ways in which dreams and determination can reshape a family, Sekaran transforms real life into a thing of beauty. From rural Oaxaca to Berkeley's Gourmet Ghetto to the dreamscapes of Silicon Valley, Lucky Boy offers a moving and revelatory look at the evolving landscape of the American dream and the ever-changing borders of love.
